What is non-matriculated?

- Allowed to take classes without being admitted as a degree-seeking student
- Courses taken by a non-matriculated student may later count toward a degree
- Earning college credit / not yet earning a degree

**Course description**\_This course introduces students to the concept of culture as a framework for understanding similarities and differences in behavior and values in human societies from all parts of the world. The intersections and complexity of historical, social, political, economic and religious structures and forces in cultures are examined. Most case studies are from non-Western cultures in South America, Africa and Oceania, but examples and links to cultural and social-economic diversity within the United States are also integral to the course. Emphasis is placed on understanding how culture patterns human thought and feelings about the natural environment, social relations, history and "others". An underlying theme is that anthropological knowledge can be used to solve contemporary local and global issues.

#### The course aim to:

1. Provide students with an in-depth study of the social, political, economic and religious systems of selected cultures from different parts of the world so as to make the "strange" so familiar that the familiar seems strange by comparison.

2. Introduce students to the concepts, theories and methods of cultural anthropology

3. Enhance the cultural literacy (i.e., framework for understanding any culture) of students

### classes for one semester

College classes are for one semester only —a semester is 15 weeks.

# <u>credit hours</u>

Classes are between 1 - 5 credit hours. Majority of classes are 3 credits.

# homework

3 credit class x 2-3 hours = 6-9 hours of study/prep time outside of class

# start with intro level classes

only take lower-division classes, 1000+ level and 2000+ level courses



#### HSUP students must maintain a 2.0 or higher cumulative GPA.

2 = good standing

If a student's GPA falls below a 2.0 in HSUP courses, they will be placed on probation and dismissed from the program.
